


• SJVW now offers a two-hour intro workshop for non-members. We travel to a site, present, answer



questions, and spread the word. We can use onsite equipment or our own (e.g., projector, computer). The workshop focuses on the basics of story structure, characterization, and showing/not telling. It's interactive, fun, and perfect for students, retirees, homeowner associations, church groups, hospital staff, library groups, and others who are looking to get their feet (pens? keyboards?) wet.   of the San Joaquin Valley. For details, click on the image below.



#### **Writing Tips and Tidbits**

- Thinking about self-publishing? There are eight common mistakes to avoid. Do you know what they are? <u>Click here</u> to find out. - Curious about Submittable? Submittable is an online platform that helps writers and artists submit their work to various opportunities, such as literary magazines, publishers, contests, grants, and more. There are two key features with Submittable. One is "Discover Opportunities." You can use Submittable to search for submission opportunities based on keywords, deadlines, and fees. Below is a screenshot of the things you can search for. The other key feature is that once you submit work, the platform allows you to keep track under the tab "Submissions." #### Anthologies: Why They're a Good Thing for Aspiring Writers

Do you dream of seeing your name in print? Anthologies might just be your golden ticket to the publishing world! Picture this: a collection of stories, poems, or essays, all bundled up in one delightful book. It's like a literary potluck where every author brings their best dish to the table.


Anthologies are the perfect playground for both fledgling writers and seasoned wordsmiths. They often revolve around a theme, giving you a creative sandbox to play in. For instance, I've had the pleasure of contributing to two holiday-themed anthologies with the Hearts Through History Writers group. The rules were simple: whip up a Christmas tale set in any historical period, all in 10,000 words or less. It's like literary speed dating – quick, exciting, and full of potential! And you might have a piece already finished that fits with the theme or with the slightest of tweaks fits. Even better!

But wait, there's more! Joining an anthology is like crash-landing into a network of fellow word-weavers. You'll rub elbows with other authors, share beta reads, and even work with professional editors. It's a masterclass in honing your craft, all while adhering to specific guidelines that push your creativity to new heights.

Now, before you dive headfirst into the anthology pool, make sure you're swimming with reputable groups. Stick to established platforms like Wattpad, Scribophile, or even Reddit. Or better yet, check out local and state-wide author communities. From the California Writers Club to the Southern California Writers Association, there's a smorgasbord of options waiting for you. And you might find places to submit to anthologies on <a href="Submittable">Submittable</a> (see above in the Tips and Tidbits section of this newsletter).

So, ready to add "published author" to your resume? Anthologies are calling your name! Who knows, your short story, poem, or memoir might just be the standout in the next big collection. Happy writing, and may the muse be with you!

#### What I learned writing my first novel ...

She savored the heat of his reaction to her lowcut, tight red dress. Yum. Dark chocolate and caramel. Her eyelids drifted closed over emerald green with vertical pupils. She opened them abruptly. Humans were delicate. Feed too deeply and they died. She didn't want to hurt anyone, but she was hungry.

That character popped out of nowhere in response to a group writing prompt one Wednesday morning. And SHE wouldn't let me alone. I'm a poet! While I spent a year learning to write prose—HER book—SHE morphed from a siren with scruples to a newly hatched dragon.

Now there's a second book in my head and a list—Notes To Self: Lessons Learned.

- 1. This is a marathon, not a one-mile fun run. You'll spend four to six hours daily in your chair. Buy a more comfortable chair. Your back will thank you. Also, get out of that chair and walk around the kitchen occasionally. Your back will thank you. And you can get coffee.
- 2. Carry a notebook. Ideas come at you while you're driving. Keep the notebook by your bed. Before sleeping, ask questions. "Why do these dragons speak English?" Your brain will answer the question in the morning. Ignore the 3 a.m. scribble that says, "sniff and shrug, the seventeenth level of personal vanity."
- Cherish the writers in your critique groups. They will tell you when to explain or describe more and share encouragement when you struggle with information dumps or point of view.
- Study the craft. Good plots don't happen by accident. But give yourself writing time to turn characters loose. It's fun when they speak up and tell you what happens next.
